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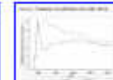
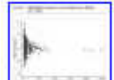
In the political literature, no firm conclusions have been drawn regarding the impact of political institutions on economic growth. This article challenges the consensus of an inconclusive relationship through a quantitative meta-analysis of the literature. It applies meta-regression analysis to the population of 483 estimates derived from 1970 to 2005. Using traditional meta-analysis estimators, the bootstrap, and Fixed and Random Effects meta-regression models, it derives several robust conclusions. Taking all the available published evidence together, it concludes that democracy does not have a direct impact on economic growth. However, democracy has robust, significant, and positive indirect effects through higher human capital, lower inflation, lower political instability, and higher levels of economic freedom. Democracies may also be associated with larger governments and less free international trade. There also appear to be country and region-specific democracy-growth effects. Overall, democracy's net effect on the economy does not seem to be detrimental. [ABSTRACT FROM AUTHOR]

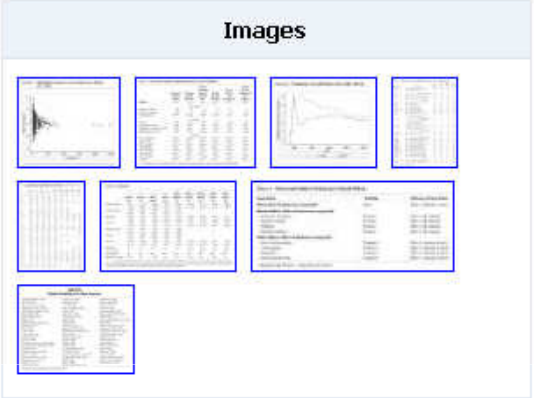

FIGURE 2 Democracy-Growth Effects, 1983–2005, All-Set

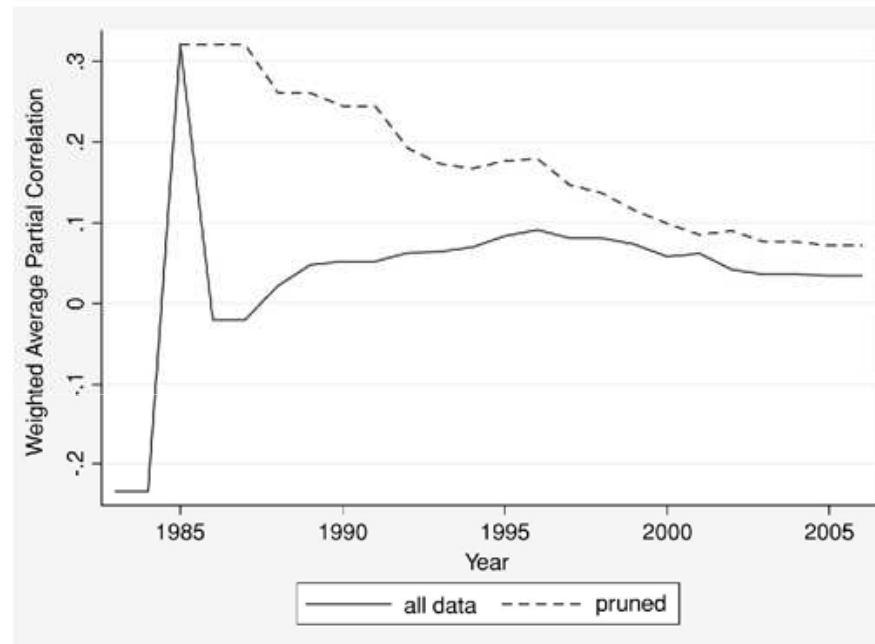


Image Caption: Democracy-Growth Effects, 1983–2005, All-Set
